## President's Message



On August 3, our LWVB/N met with LWWNYS Regional Director, Georgia DeGregorio, for our annual board training session. Georgia also serves currently as First Vice President (Membership Director) of LWWNYS. We reviewed our local League policies, particularly those regarding nonpartisanship and diversity. We then reviewed the job descriptions of those board members and officers in attendance. We had an in-depth discussion about membership and how all board members need to work as a team to recruit and retain members. We talked about recruiting new members, retaining and revitalizing current members and set goals for increasing membership this coming year. Perhaps the easiest, and most often overlooked membership activity is simply asking people you know and those you've just met to join or come to a meeting or program and see what League is all about.

Another aspect of membership growth and retention is the program itself. We are working to schedule interesting programs at times and places that will be accessible to the greatest number of Leaguers, both current and future members.

At this time we have programs and events planned for the first half of the League year. There will be a program about Local Government on September 23. On October 7, there will be a program about Buffalo's waterfront followed by an all day conference on Re-Entry (Alternatives to Incarceration) on October 24. Clean-up of Radioactive Waste Sites, climate change and of course candidate forums, the publication of the election guide, naturalization ceremonies, Great Decisions discussions and a holiday social in December, all will be important parts of the first half of our League year. I hope to see each one of you at some or all of our events.

We will again be working under the auspices of the Shoreline Sweep organized by Buffalo Niagara Riverkeeper. All Leaguers and friends are welcome. It's fun and the view is terrific from the long fishing pier!

We will drive into the park from Niagara Street on the ramp-like entrance next to 1726 Niagara Street in Buffalo. It's a short block north of the Niagara Street/Scajaquada intersection. The entrance has a large billboard and a small park sign. From the park entrance, cross the bridge spanning the Black Rock Canal. (Make sure that no one is already on the bridge as it has only one lane.) Then drive straight ahead (west) to the river. Turn right under the International Railroad Bridge and drive to the parking area at the end of the road where we will start our work.

## Primary Election 2009 in Erie and Niagara Counties

### Primary Election

- Aug. 21 - Last day to register for Primary Election at the Board of Elections - Registrations that are mailed must be postmarked by this date and received by the Board of Elections by August 26.
- Aug. 26 - Last day to notify Board of Elections of change of address
- Sept. 8 - Last day to postmark an application for an Absentee Ballot
- Sept. 14 - Last day to apply in person for an Absentee Ballot
- Sept. 14 - Last day to postmark an Absentee Ballot, which must be received by the Board of Elections no later than September 22
- Sept. 15 - Last day to deliver Absentee Ballot in person to the Board of Elections
- **Primary Election Day - Tuesday, September 15, 2009**  
 Erie County: polls open at 6:00 a.m., close at 9:00 p.m.  
 Niagara County: polls open at noon, close at 9:00 p.m.

So, in a sense, the Nominating Committee is made up of all League members.

We are truly dependent for our success on strong League member participation in this process in order to have a large pool of nominees to select from when building the 2010-2012 slate. That will only happen if members like you tell us about the leaders you admire.

**Remember to carry your reusable tote bags wherever you go!** Use them at Farmer's Markets, for clothing, incidentals—everything! I keep some for food products, others for meeting materials. Small bags that fit into your purse are available. They open to become large, strong bags that you can always have with you.

**Purchase a reusable, washable dry cleaning bag.** Return your plastic dry cleaning bags to the cleaners and ask them to reuse the bags.

Whenever you shop in places that sell harmful pesticide products, take a moment to look for the notice of the Erie County Pesticide Neighbor Notification Law. If you don't readily find this notice, tell the manager you are concerned, because this is a health and safety issue, and the notice should be posted in a prominent place.
