## **Naturalization Ceremonies**

On June 7, Elaine Cusker and Eileen Cassidy registered 37 new voters at the new citizens ceremony at the Robert H. Jackson U.S. Courthouse.

Sharon Cramer and Kathleen Macaluso represented the League on July 5 at the courthouse. They greeted and distributed voter registration forms to 50 new citizens with 42 people completing their forms. Some members of the audience also registered. All new citizens who did not register took their forms home to be completed later or online.

There have been five naturalization ceremonies since August. Thank you to the volunteers, in some cases on very short notice. There have been three ceremonies at the courthouse, one at the Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural Site, and one at Iroquois High School. Many thanks go to Michele Greco, Eileen Cassidy, Kathleen Macaluso, Sharon Cramer, Ramona Gallager, Joyce DiCristina, Barbara Weitzner-Linn, Timothy Priano, Betty Krist, Sandra O'Hara, Joan Eschner and Ellen Neumaier.

Since naturalization ceremonies resumed on August 4, 2022, we have met with 777 new citizens and registered 619 or 81%. They came from all over the world, from Afghanistan to Yemen and many countries in between.

Volunteers are needed on November 1 and December 6 for the ceremonies taking place in downtown Buffalo at the U.S. Courthouse. You will meet people from many countries and help them register to vote. # **West Valley Citizen Task Force**

## What is the West Valley Citizen Task Force? Could you be involved?

The League of Women Voters of Buffalo-Niagara has a seat on the West Valley Citizen Task Force (CTF). I have filled that seat since January 2019, regularly attending monthly meetings in Ashford, south of Springville on Highway 219, or on Zoom. The evening meetings usually last from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. They provide an opportunity to learn what is happening in the remediation of the site and provide input to New York State Energy Research and Development Authority and the Department of Energy about community concerns regarding the nuclear waste site at West Valley. Members also communicate what is happening there to organizations with which they are affiliated.

CTF members are encouraged to find an alternate. Might you be interested in considering that role? If so, it would be easy to start observing some online CTF meetings and chatting with me. If you would like more information, let me know at the email address below! This would be a good time to get involved, with some important decisions being made about site remediation that will have implications for the environmental health of our region.

Founded in 1997 with 19 members, the CTF currently has 16 members. Three of them are staffers for the New York State assemblyman and senator. Others represent the Towns of Ashford and Concord and the Cattaraugus County and Erie County governments. Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center has a member, as do the local school system and the workers' union. The Seneca Nation is represented because their reservation is downstream of the site along Cattaraugus Creek. Environmental groups are represented by the Coalition on West Valley Nuclear Wastes, formed two decades before the CTF.

In July 1998, the CTF issued a detailed report on its consensus on the principles that should guide the choice of a preferred alternative for the cleanup and closure of the site. Those remain in effect as we enter the year or so leading up to the release of the Draft Supplementary Environmental Impact Statement (DSEIS), which should finally make that recommendation.

### **Candidate Forums**

This fall, Deborah Cohen joined me in coordinating candidate forums. It has been wonderful to work with her and I look forward to when she decides she's ready to take charge and I can just be her behind-the-scenes helper. We worked with community organizations on Grand Island to set up one forum until some of them objected to the League Empty Chair policy and they hosted their own event. We also planned a forum for the Ellicott District Common Council race. However, when one candidate declined our invitation, we needed to cancel that forum at the last minute.

On October 17, the League hosted a candidate forum for Erie County Executive, Erie County Legislative District 10 and the Aurora Town Board. It was very well attended. Unfortunately, while we thought we were videotaping the event, we succeeded only in getting some still photos. Many thanks to Ellen Moomaw, event coordinator and question screener, Judy Weidemann, moderator, Ellen Neumaier, videographer, and Joanne Wahl, timekeeper.

The candidate forum on October 26 at the Amherst Center for Senior Services featured the elections for Erie County Executive and Amherst Town Board. In both Erie County Legislator races, one candidate reported having scheduling conflicts, and we never had a response from one candidate for the highway superintendent, so we couldn't hear from any of the other candidates. Many of us are not pleased with this practice which is a state League directive. We appreciate the fine work of our volunteers: Ramona Gallagher, moderator; Deb Cohen, question screener; Lori Robinson, videographer; Mike Egan, timekeeper; and Janet Goodsell and Jess Kent, ushers.
